

110th Anzac-Day-Speech-for-High-Profile-Events-Honouring-Sacrifice-and-Inspiring-Unity

Ladies and gentlemen, veterans, service men and women, distinguished guests, and fellow citizens.

This morning, we gather on [Gadigal] Country, and I acknowledge and pay my respects to their Elders past, present, and emerging.

I also pay my respects to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and women who have contributed to the defence of Australia in times of peace and war. Today, we honour their invaluable contributions, and we extend our deepest gratitude to all current and former members of the Australian Defence Force present here, as well as the families of Defence personnel. Your service, sacrifice, and ongoing support are what allow us to enjoy the freedoms we hold dear, and for that, we thank you.

Today, we stand together on this hallowed ground, under the vast sky, to commemorate a significant milestone – the 110th anniversary of Anzac Day. On this day, 110 years ago, Australian and New Zealand soldiers landed at Gallipoli in an operation that would become etched in the annals of history, forever shaping the identity of our nations.

Anzac Day is not simply a date on a calendar; it is a powerful and enduring symbol of the courage, resilience, and sacrifice displayed by generations of Australians who answered the call to serve. From the shores of Gallipoli to the battlefields of World War II, from the jungles of Vietnam to the deserts of Afghanistan, the brave men and women of our Defence Forces have exemplified the spirit of selflessness that has defined our country.
