

110th Anzac-Day-Speech-for-Primary-Schools-Remembering-Heroes-and-Embracing-the Anzac-Spirit

This morning, we gather on [Gadigal] Country, and we acknowledge and pay our respects to their Elders past, present, and emerging.

I also wish to honour the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and women who have served in the defence of Australia, both in times of peace and war. Today, we recognise and thank all current and former members of the Australian Defence Force, as well as the families who support them.

Today, we gather to mark 110 years of Anzac Day, a day when we remember the brave men and women who have served and protected Australia.

The word "Anzac" stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The Anzacs were everyday people – just like us – who showed great courage and kindness in difficult times. They looked after each other, worked as a team, and never gave up.
